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## **HISTORICAL NOTES -- by Bob O'Neal**

Why did you join a historical society? Was it because you feel sentimental? Did you want to become involved in your community? Or do you just love history? Was history your favorite subject in school? Do you love historical dates? Here is a quiz to test your knowledge. In what year did the following occur?

- 1) The British signed a peace agreement with the Zulu chiefs.
- 2) Joseph Stalin and Leon Trosky were born.
- 3) Lord Beaverbrrok, E.M. Forster, William Beveridge and J.C. Maxwell were born.
- 4) Paul Klee and Albert Einstein were born.
- 5) The public was granted unrestricted admission to the British Museum.
- 6) A daughter was born to William Gibbons of Marcellus on May 3rd.
- 7) In Marcellus, a weekly, The Marcellus Observer, began publication.

What year was it? The Observer editor's salutatory article, dated April 17, 1879, stated that the Observer would serve civilization and Christianity. Unless you are related to William Gibbons, or a descendent of the publisher of the Observer, you may not have passed the test. You may not be interested in the parts of history listed above, until you find out that they are connected to something that may be of significance to you personally.

The quiz may have been easier if I only included easily recognized names like Stalin and Einstein. Or, I might have added even more unfamiliar items if it was for a Trivial Pursuit game. In this introductory column, I hope to get some debate going about how our local past fits into the art and science of history. My quiz presented one way to define history, dates and events. But history is more than dates and events. It is more than just memories. The Marcellus Historical Society has collected items from it's town that represent the memory of its citizens. History is events or objects explained.

In upcoming newsletters, I would like to explain more about 1879's Marcellus. I will relate items from the Marcellus Observer to my limited knowledge of the outside world. A wonderful thing about Marcellus is that it has not grown too much. Continuity is one theme we can look at. That is how it is in 1996, Marcellus is similar and yet different to an earlier day. Take for example our street addresses. Sometimes we don't need them if we have a good landmark. For example, a new store with the address "At The Willow Tree." Was that 1996, or 1879? I'm sure you probably guessed correctly. If you look in the 1879 Observer, you find the real name of that store. If you don't get a chance to look, join me again in the next issue for information on "the store by the willow" and other local stores of that era.

#### THE FABRIC COLLECTION -- by Bonniebelle O'Neal

Many years ago I read a book entitled "The Subversive Stitch," about how badly women were treated throughout the ages, as seen by needle workers often dreary and poverty ridden lives. The book gave stitchery a black eye from women as well as men. Yet, generally before the 1800's, men would proudly show off household needlework (some of which they did themselves) and devoted pages on various sewing subjects in that great new 1700's rage, the encyclopedia. Today, men, and a majority of women, don't know the difference between crochet and crewelwork.

The Industrial Revolution of the 1830's initiated the decline, despising workers who couldn't match a machine's output, but prizing their finished product. It took only about 20 years for "fancy work" and about 50 years for plain sewing to be degraded to a nonessential occupation. Unfortunately today's attitude toward clothes, and especially fancy work, jades our ideas of how to view yesterday's rare prizes. There used to be literally billions of hand-wrought fiber products. Commonly converted into rags, not many are left. Marcellus has been blessed with having many more of these items than any other local historical society I've ever seen.

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#### NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Let me start by saying welcome to all of our many new members. Your support of our goals is greatly appreciated. We currently have many active members, but can always use more.
