OUR VILLAGE CLOCK ... Doug Whitman

In late October, I had an opportunity to climb into the belfry of a historic Marcellus landmark (built in 1877-8) which has fascinated me for many years. I gladly accepted an invitation from Historical Society President, Bill Reagan, to assist with replacement of two lamps for the clock faces on the Methodist Church tower. Hearing the bell hourly, and seeing the clock's faces from my front porch day or night, have kept me punctual during my twenty-two years of Marcellus residency.

In 1909, our village clock's castbrass mechanism was purchased, for \$500 from the H.J. Howe, Co. in Syracuse, and donated to the Methodist Church by Mr. and Mrs. George Case, local farmers.

Made and installed by E. Howard & Company, Boston, MA, the heavy machine was hoisted with a block and tackle to the fifth floor of the Church belfry where all but the hand-crank assembly and weights still reside. A single linkage-rod extends from the top of the clock mechanism to the tower's sixth floor where its rotation is transferred through a gearbox and more linkage to each of the four sets of clock hands. (Supporting the central gearbox is a board from the clock's original shipping crate stenciled: "H. J. Howe; Care E. V. Baker [Postmaster]; Marcellus Onondaga Co. N.Y.")

For \$50, Marcellus resident, Edgar Bartlett built the six-foot wooden clock faces, and three-foot hands with iron balance rods, and installed them on the belfry 64 feet above the ground. On Tuesdays and Fridays, Mr. Bartlett, D.F. Coon, or Fred Woodbridge maintained and wound the clock. They climbed on crude ladders through the belfry chambers housing the clock's 145-pound running-weight and 800-pound striking-weight.

In the early 1960's, the Methodist Church donated its landmark clock to the Village of Marcellus, and Mr. Mel Corp assumed primary responsibility as the last person to wind the clock's huge weights by hand.

Perched high above the clock's faces, on the eventh (and top) floor of the belfry, is the 40-inch wide by 36-inch high cast-bronze bell made in 1876 at Troy, NY by the Meneely & Kimberly Foundry.

(Since the belfry was constructed in 1877-8 as part of the original church structure, I'm assuming the M&K bell was installed in it at that time.)

From installation to 1909, the bell was rung by pulling a rope extending down five floors to the church vestibule. The rope was connected to the 6-foot, 3-inch great-wheel on the bell's West side. A manual pull-rope is still used to ring the bell for special occasions, but now it operates a striking mallet, rather than rocking the huge bell North and South in its massive cast iron suspension cradle. The bell's large clapper still hangs within its vessel.

In 1962, with \$795 in donations from the Marcellus Rotary and Citizen's Clubs, the clock's original weights were removed and electric motors installed to drive its running and striking mechanisms. The conversion was contracted to the Bert Rogers firm from Harrisburg, PA, by then Mayor, Lester Norris. The Rogers firm removed the hand-crank mechanism and weights from the tower.

Now, a large metal mallet connected to the clock's striking mechanism rings the bell on the hour. Electric lights illuminate the four clock-faces at night. Modern ladders have replaced the old ones used for climbing through the tower chambers to maintain the clock, bell, strike mallets and lights.

Since electrification, annual maintenance has continued to be performed by the Rogers firm from Harrisburg, and routine maintenance by Lester Norris, Ray Lawless and George Haggett.

Following Mr. Haggett's recent death, the village has made arrangements with Bill Reagan and Doug Whitman who are now providing routine care and time adjustments when needed.

SPEAKING OF CLOCKS...

The Marcellus Historical Society has four clocks in its collection, all of which need cleaning and/or repair to make them again operational. One clock is particularly valuable, historically speaking. It was made at the Marcellus Falls, Smith Clock factory circa 1833. Another is a large Ithaca Calendar wall clock from the First National Bank of Marcellus.

We are requesting that a person or group donate the funds or services necessary to restore our clocks to working order. If you may be that person or group, please call Bill Reagan at 463-4160. ■

NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT — Bill Reagan

As 1996 comes to a close I've taken a few moments to look back at all that the Marcellus Historical Society has accomplished this year. I can't thank everyone enough who has helped our organization come so far in just twelve months. The greatest accomplishment by far has to be growing from 31 members in one state to 457 members in 12 states including New York, Ohio, Georgia, Indiana, Texas, California, Tennessee, Illinois, Florida, Kansas, South Carolina and Washington. I knew there was a great interest in our local history and am very pleased that so many people have chosen to support the historical society.

Other accomplishments in 1996 include publishing an index for "Nine Mile Country;" publishing "Marcellus Through The Years, 1774-1996, A Chronological History;" reorganizing our museum, a historic walking tour and two open houses at our museum. The most recent open house coincided with the Marcellus Chamber of Commerce events on Saturday December 7 and included a special display on the Marcellus and Otisco Lake Railway. This past year the society also started collection and preservation programs for photographs and family histories, sponsored field trips to the Onondaga County Court House, the Catholic Diocese Archives, the Onondaga Historical Association and the Rose Hill Baptist Church and, of course, we started our newspaper.

1997 should be another exciting year. Beginning with the historical society re-releasing the official Marcellus afghan (an order form is on page 7 of this newspaper), we have many things planned. During Old Home Days in June we will have an open house at our museum which will include another special display and we will have a float in the annual parade. A Marcellus Historic Homes Tour is being planned for autumn and a note card set featuring historic sites in Marcellus as well as a collectors set of historic Marcellus postcards are in the works. Other publications we are working on include a historic coloring book for children, an in depth book on the history of the mills along Nine Mile Creek through Marcellus and a book and

registry of historic homes in Marcellus.

As you know, we are striving to gain a new building for our museum. A building in which we can safely preserve and display our huge collection of over 1,500 historic artifacts from Marcellus' past. In order to obtain this new museum we will need to receive grants which are available from many sources. What you may not know is that many of these grants require us to raise a certain percent of funds ourselves, such as twenty percent of the

grant amount. It is crucial that we raise this money in order to receive the grants. Two of our major fund raisers for this year will be the sale of afghans and the historic home tour. Please remember the importance of these events as they occur.

In order to accomplish all that we have planned we need the support of the community. I would like to remind our members to please renew your membership and if you are not yet a member, please join today. Much of we do would not be possible without the support of our members, including this newspaper! One last note, please support our advertisers and let them know you saw their ad in our newspaper. Without the support of our advertisers we will not be able to

print this newspaper.


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ELECTION RESULTS

OFFICIAL MARCELLUS PIN AND AFGHAN FOR SALE

The Village of Marcellus has produced an official Marcellus pin. The pins depict the old village fire barn which was constructed in 1884, and say "Marcellus" on the front. They sell for \$5.00 and all proceeds go to the Marcellus Historical Society. The pins are available at our gift shop, at the village and town halls and from some local merchants.

The historical society is re-releasing the official Marcellus afghan in green and cranberry as a fund raiser for our new museum. First released during the 1994 bicentennial, the afghan was produced by Jean Schneider and depicts many historic Marcellus landmarks on it. THE MARTISCO PAPER MILL . . . Bill Reagan

In 1852 George Reed and Sanford Dalliba, two Marcellus business men, purchased the site at Marcellus Falls on which had stood the Phillip Smith Clock Factory. Reed and Dalliba commenced the construction of a new dam built of wood and stone (a few rods north of the old log dam) and the construction of a new brick paper mill. When the walls were nearly completed the work came to a standstill until early in 1853 when N.G. Case bought a one third interest in the mill and the firm became George Reed & Company.

The work resumed, the dam and building were finished. They installed a Fourdriner machine for making white print and book paper. One of the first items made from the product of the mill was a large family bible which was printed by an Auburn firm.

Reed & Company ran the mill, considered one of the best in the state, quite successfully for about a year, making paper for the Albany Argus, Moore's Rural New Yorker, New York World and many other publications. In 1854 the firm was reorganized as Reed & Case after Dalliba's other business ventures failed. The business continued successfully until 1859 when Case's boot making business in Auburn failed for a large amount which involved the firm of Reed & Case at the Falls and caused them to fail. The bank foreclosed on the mortgage and in 1861 the property was sold.

After changing hands again, in 1862 Benjamin Culver purchased the mill and went to great expense in putting new machinery in to bleach straw for making printing paper of it. Culver owned and operated the mill for several years and finally sold it to John F. Jones. Mr. Jones owned the Genesee Mills at Rochester and was reported to be very wealthy. He put a lot of money into the property at the Falls and unfortunately overextended himself. Two or three years later the mill was turned over to his creditors who ran it for a while and then it was sold under foreclosure to the firm of Lawless and Tierney in April of 1875.

Lawless and Tierney built a new, stronger dam on the creek and installed new machinery. They added a large brick chimney and new boiler. The mill produced three to four tons of paper a day at this time and became known as the Eagle Mill. The Lawless family continued running the mill until 1959 at which time it was sold to the Martisco Paper Company which was originally called the Onondaga Paper Company.

In 1990 Agnes and Darryl Meiers of Marcellus purchased the mill. Today the mill employs about twenty full and part time workers who turn newspapers and cardboard into what is known as bogus, a specialty paper used in wrapping.
