THE HISTORIC MARCELLUS AMERICAN LEGION BUILDING ... Bill Reagan

Anyone recently driving down East Main Street may have noticed a fundraising sign in front of the American Legion building. Our neighbors who care for the building are trying to raise money for a new roof. Why should the average Marcellian care? The building at 13 East Main Street is one of the most historic structures in the Village of Marcellus.

Built about 1840 for a store by Joseph Taylor and his son George, the building which presently houses American Legion Ralph Share Post # 297 is one of the most beautiful on Main Street. Its facia, constructed of bricks made in Marcellus and trimmed with ornate woodwork, has been well preserved for over a century and a half.

Before the store itself was completed, the building was used as the headquarters for the "Tippecanoe and Tyler, too" Whig campaign of 1840. Shortly after the store was opened, Joseph Taylor's son George died and Newton Giles Case became a partner in the business. (Later, Case was one of the owners of what became the Martisco Paper Mill.)

Joseph Taylor became quite well known in the area. He was the main local dealer in grain, pork and beef. His business made Marcellus a market-place for surrounding towns. Taylor was also very popular as a pettifogger. In his later years he accepted the appointment of constable and became well known as a very successful collector of private debts.

During the mid-1800's, storekeepers like Taylor and Case would trade items for eggs, butter and other homemade goods brought in by local women. They would replenish their stock of dry goods, household items and medicine once a year, usually in the spring, traveling by stage to and from New York City. When the storekeepers returned they were greeted warmly by the townspeople who were excitedly waiting for the display of new merchandise and for news from New York City.

By the early 1900's Patrick Kelly and James Hogan were operating the store in the Legion building until Hogan became postmaster and Kelly teamed with John Thornton and moved the business to the village center. Soon after, the Coyne brothers opened a barber shop and poolroom in the Legion building and John Heenan operated a furniture and undertaking business on the second floor.

In 1940 Arthur and Rose Waters opened the first self-service "cash and carry" grocery store in the Legion building. Under the name of "Little Giant Foods," it was the forerunner of the modern day supermarket. In 1943, the Ralph Share Post #297 of the American Legion purchased the building and remodeled it to provide for a meeting room and kitchen on the first floor and living quarters on the second floor. They also installed new windows across the front of the building.

Today the building houses the Ralph Share Post, is used as a meeting place and is available for functions such as wedding receptions. It is however in need of a new roof. KATHRYN C. HEFFERNAN . . . Peg Nolan

Kathryn C. Heffernan worked as an educator for forty-one years. She came to Marcellus in 1944 and for twenty-six years was a teacher and administrator at Marcellus Central School.

She was a communicant and organist of St. Francis Xavier Roman Catholic Church, secretary of Marcellus Community Council, member of the Marcellus Community Chorale, Trustee of Marcellus Free Library and secretary of the Chester Driver Memorial Scholarship fund.

Among her many accomplishments, she wrote a history of the Saint Francis Xavier Church in 1973. She also authored, "Nine Mile Country, The History Of The Town Of Marcellus, N.Y." which was published in 1978. This book took hundreds of hours to research and write and is the most comprehensive history of Marcellus to date.

The Kathryn C. Heffernan Elementary School, constructed in 1952, was named in her honor for the many years she dedicated to helping Marcellus students get the best education possible.

She was a wonderful, loyal person that gave so much to this community in so many ways.


WHAT'S A "HATCHEL?" ... Doug Whitman

Among the many tools and implements in the back room at the historical society museum are three sinister-looking, "bed-of-nails" devices that attracted considerable attention during the holiday open house. Visitors asked, "What are those things?" ...to which we replied, "They are "Hatchels!"

Hatchels were used for separating the coarse and fine plant fibers from the stems of flax (Linum usitatissimum). The soft fibers were spun into the linen thread, rope, or cord used in making various textiles.

The coarse, dried, flax stems were hurled onto the hatchel's points, and drawn through them breaking and removing the coarse fibers...leaving the fine, soft fibers intact for spinning and weaving.

Flax mills were operated briefly by Elijah Manley in Tyler Hollow (circa 1850) — south of



Linseed oil, another important flax product, was made by brothers John Seba and David Bonta (circa 1825) at the former Marcellus Powder Company site — just north of the lower Crown Mill. Linseed oil is made from flax (Linum) seed, as the name implies. Flax seed is also used as a poultice.

The Marcellus Historic Homes Registry is an effort to build a repository of historical information for future generations. But think about it . . . wouldn't it have been great if Edward Moir had written down a few details about 8 Orange Street during the time he lived there? What architect and/or construction company designed and built the house? What year was it built? How did Moir change it, and when? Were there ever additional buildings on the property? What major events in the village or township relate to this house? Are there photos of the house or property?

These are just some of the questions for which the Historic Homes Registry seeks answers for ALL current houses in the Town of Marcellus. SOCIETY TO SPONSOR FREE TOUR OF DRIVER MIDDLE SCHOOL



Constructed in 1936-7, the Chester S. Driver Middle School

in Marcellus is one of the finest school buildings of its era. In honor of its 60th anniversary, the Marcellus Historical Society is sponsoring a historic tour of the building on Saturday April 26th. at 1:00 p.m. Those wishing to take the tour should enter through the (west) Reed Parkway entrance. The tour will begin in the auditorium with a presentation about the history of the building, including home movies which show it under construction.

MARCELLUS HOMES IN RESTORATION

We are delighted to see restorations underway on two important Marcellus Village landmarks!

The Greek-revival Tefft-North-Clark house built by Dr. Lake I. Tefft in 1827 at 18 North Street, now owned by Mr. & Mrs. Lewis Steadman, is having its front steps, columns and



portico restored to original configurations. Dr. Tefft was a local physician who also had interests in a local powder mill. Wesley C. Clark was a Dean of the Journalism School at Syracuse University and a former owner of the Marcellus Observer/Skaneateles Press.



The Edward Moir house at 8 Orange street, now owned by Patricia Tucker. Pat and her husband are restoring it — inside and out — to its original appearance. Edward Moir had

the Gothic-revival house built circa 1900. Moir was one of the owners of the Crown Woolen Mills in Marcellus.

The Marcellus Historical Society continues to encourage restoration of homes and buildings within the township and offers help with old photos and information archived at the museum. SAINT JOHN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH ... Bill Reagan

The first Episcopal Church services were held in 1824 in the village schoolhouse which is now part of the back of the present day Presbyterian Church. Under the direction of Rev. Augustus Converse of Skaneateles, Saint John's Episcopal Church of Marcellus was incorporated with Harvey Andrews and Caleb Cowles as church wardens. Vestrymen included Dr. Richard Davis, Leonard Blanchard, John Herring, Gad Curtis, Zabina Moses, David Earll, Zera Shepard and Austin Godard. John Bixby was chosen as clerk of the vestry.

In 1833, a church was built on the northwest corner of Main and North Streets to serve the congregation. The first building, however, was destroyed by fire in 1866 and a new building was

completed in February of 1870.

This second building was also destroyed by fire in 1879, in the worst fire in the history of the village. A third church was erected on Orange Street in 1881. This building was located where the rear portion of Nojaim's grocery store is today. By the 1920's this third building was in need of repair. In 1924 the church made arrangements to purchase from Edward Moir the land at the southwest corner of Orange and Maple Streets.

The church opened its parish house on the Maple Street side of this parcel. Now a decision had to made whether to build a new church next door or move the old church to the site and renovate it. It was decided to move the old church and to restore the building. The church was moved by team and wagon the length of Orange Street and work was completed in six months. The Pilot Memorial Hall was added to the rear of the church in 1959. In 1961 the adjacent John Moir home was purchased for a rectory.
