# MEMORIAL DAY ADDRESS... Bill Reagan

(Part Two)



Two Marcellians lost their lives while serving in the Korean War. They were Clifford Cronk and Daniel Welch.

Clifford Cronk was killed in action in Korea in 1951, at the age of 20. The son of Mr. & Mrs.

Arlington Cronk, Clifford attended Marcellus Central School and enlisted in the Army when he was 17. Along with his parents, Clifford was survived by four brothers.

Daniel Welch was in the Marine Corp. He was killed in action in the Korean War in March of 1953 while serving in the 2nd Marine Tank Battalion. Torporal Welch Road is named in his honor. Among those he left behind was his sister, Julie Karlik. Twenty one years after Daniel's death, his nephew, her son, Richard Karlik of Marcellus, was killed in an accident in South Carolina while serving in the Marines. Rick joined the Marines upon graduating from Marcellus High School and had been in almost four years when he died in 1985. He was in the same graduating class as Rick. He had many friends in school and his death was a great loss.

I also spoke recently with Hugh Dawson and Tom Gilmore. Marcellian Hugh Dawson served in the Air Force in both World War II and Korea. Hugh flew dive-bombers in the Pacific while serving in the Marine Corp during World War II. He had enlisted prior to the bombing of Pearl Harbor. In 1946 Hugh was commissioned to 2nd Lieutenant in the reserves and in 1952 he was recalled to serve in Korea through 1954. After 28 years of service, he retired a Lieutenant Colonel. Hugh recently had the honor of carrying the Olympic torch. Perhaps one of the men whose names are this monument may have also shared such an honor.

Marcellus resident Tom Gilmore served in the ietnam War. Tom is the present Commander of Ralph Share American Legion Post 297. Tom was drafted into the Army in 1969 while working at

Priest Chevrolet and fought in Vietnam in 1970 and 71. He was stationed in the Demilitarized Zone for twelve months and served on an armored reconnaisance unit. These units consisted of several tanks and were known as "moving fox holes." They were responsible for patrolling areas within the D.M.Z.

Two Marcellians were killed during the Vietnam War. They were John Rodney Bass and David Driver.

The brother of Marcellian Eileen Kennedy, John Rodney Bass was on his way to Vietnam on June 4, 1964 when he was killed at the age of 30 in an air crash in the Philippines. Rodney, as he was called, was a pilot in the Air Force's 13th Bomb Squadron and had served in Japan for a year before going to the Philippines. He was checking the skills of another pilot who had been on a leave of absence, when the plane went down, killing both men. Rodney also left behind his wife, Diane Schmuckmeir, and their three children, Kim, Kristen and a son, John Rodney the third, who was born after Rodney was killed.

David Driver was a Lieutenant in the US Navy when he was killed in 1969 at the age of 26 at McChord Air Force base in Tacoma, Washington. He was the son of Chester S. and Maxine Driver and brother of Nancy. Our middle school is named after Chester. David was killed in the crash of a Navy jet. His father had died just 6 years earlier. David was an outstanding high school athlete who graduated from Marcellus Central School in 1961. He received an appointment to Annapolis where he graduated in 1965. David had been involved in combat in Vietnam and had returned to the United States only recently before his death.

One Marcellus High School graduate was killed during the Persian Gulf War. Patrick Kelly Connor had lived in Marcellus just a short time before going off to war in Desert Storm. He was a United State Navy Navigator / Bombardier. Patrick was on a mission off the shore of Kuwait on February 2, 1991, when his A-6E radioed that it was under hostile fire. The jet never made it back to the carrier. After an intense search, his jet was never found. At the age of 25, he was declared

missing in action. Patrick was survived by his

parents, Bill and Marsha, and two brothers, Jeff and Scott. As with all veterans killed in action, Patrick's death was a devastating loss to his family.

The most recent Marcellus veteran to lose his life while in the service was Michael Jones, the son of Beverly Blakeslee. Michael was 29 years old when he lost his life while serving in the Air Force in North Carolina. He had served in the Marines for three years, then attended college before going into the Air Force. During an Air Force investigation, Mike and another pilot were instructed to imitate a maneuver which had caused another jet to crash in Indiana, when their jet crashed. When Michael was killed on April 28, 1992, he left behind a wife.

All of the men and women who serve in the United States Armed Forces deserve our recognition as the heroes which they are. It is through the sacrifice of these neighbors, friends and relatives that the United States of America remains the greatest country in the history of the world - a country whose people enjoy more freedoms than anywhere else on earth. In countries all over the world, the freedoms of people are repressed - it is not uncommon to see men, women and children holding machine guns on street corners. The rights of their citizens are nonexistent.

But here, the citizens of the United States remain free. We have freedoms which we take for granted, but are unseen in many other parts of the world. Freedoms which exist because of a Constitution and Bill of Rights written over two hundred years ago, and defended to this day by the great men and women who serve in the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines and Coast Guard. It is with great respect and appreciation that we remember our veterans and the sacrifices which they made in the name of our great nation, especially those men and women who were killed or declared missing in action. As citizens of the United States, it is our duty to make sure that our veterans who made such sacrifices are never forgotten. (Part one of this address was printed in our last newsletter.)

### HISTORIC HOMES REGISTRY

The Marcellus Historic Homes Registry is being undertaken by the MHS to: collect and perserve information about historically significant homes in Marcellus; promote preservation and appreciation of Marcellus homes; publish the history of selected Marcellus homes in book form; include historic Marcellus homes on MHS Tours and; promote general interest and appreciation of our rich local history.

The MHS has developed guidelines and forms to help you research and register your home. Use of the forms will ensure that everyone submits similar basic information — and additional data is

encouraged if you know it.

What qualifies a home for registry? The registry is open to every home (new and old) within the Town-ship of Marcellus, especially homes relating to residents or events that have contributed (or may contribute in the future) to local history! This definition includes your home, and every other home within the township.

Everyone in the Marcellus Township wishing to register their home should request printed guidelines and forms from Doug Whitman, who will coordinate the project (673-4091) — a \$3 fee for printing & mailing is requested. Lists of resources and other data are printed in the guidelines to help you with the information on the forms. So, please request an information packet and enjoy your research!

Anyone who previously obtained the forms should send completed copies to us or call if they need help.



### ASK THE HISTORIANS

- Q. Where did Orange Street get its name? M.D.
- A. Folklore has it that the Scottish who came in the 1880's to work in the woolen mill at the corner of Orange and Maple Streets weren't particularly happy about the road directly behind the mill being named Limerick Street and the next road up being Dublin Road, both named for the Irish. So, in order to have their homeland represented, the street in front of the upper mill was named Orange street, and the street facing the lower mill was named Scotch Hill Road.
- Q. I heard that a bell used to be on the roof of the Crown Woolen Mill which stood at the corner of Orange and Maple Streets. Why was it there and where is it today? - B.R.
- A. There was a large bell on the tower of the upper woolen mill. It was used to call the milt employees into work each morning. Tradition also states that the night-watchman was required to ring the bell once every hour so that the mill owner knew he wasn't sleeping. Thanks in large part to Lester Norris, the bell is now part of our museum collection.




Eichelberger home, 4418 Frank Gay Rd.
