MUCH MORE THAN A TROUT STREAM...Bill Reagan

The scenic, winding creek through Marcellus is said to have been named Nine Mile as it was situated exactly nine miles west of the settlement at Onondaga Hill. You can imagine an early traveler in the eighteen hundreds being given the directions; "Go west nine miles and you'll cross a creek."

That creek turned out to be a perfect source of power for supporting mills of all types, and thus was born what is today referred to as a "Great place to live," the Town of Marcellus.

Whether you call it a creek or a crick, the influence of Nine Mile on the Town of Marcellus was tremendous. Flowing north from its source at Otisco Lake for about twenty miles to Onondaga Lake, the creek once supported dozens of mills and businesses along its banks within the borders of Marcellus.

The first mill was, appropriately enough for a new settlement, a saw mill. The Rice - Bradley Saw Mill was built in 1795, the year after the Town of Marcellus was founded. It was located at the base of East Hill, south of Main Street on the west side of the creek.

Many other mills followed, some of them becoming major employers in the town.

The first paper mill in New York State opened on Nine Mile Creek in 1806. It was located about a mile and a half north of the village center, just north of the present Martisco Paper Mill which itself began operating in 1852. Martisco Paper still runs a successful business today producing "bogus" for use in packaging.

In the year 1812, the first woolen mill was opened in Marcellus on the west bank of the creek near the intersection of Orange and Maple Streets. That wooden structure burned in 1847 and was replaced by a brick woolen mill in 1848. Called the "upper Crown Woolen Mill," it closed in 1955 and was torn down in 1986. At one time this mill produced wool for civil war uniforms.

Its sister mill, the "lower Crown Woolen Mill," was constructed next to the creek on North Street in 1880. Still standing today, it closed in 1961. Between them, the two mills at one time employed over 300 people.

And so it went. Over the decades, on about thirty-five different sites along Nine Mile Creek

in Marcellus, stood grist mills, a gun powder factory, linseed oil mill, barley mill, saw mill, clock factory, several paper mills, a plaster mill, a brewery and distillery and just about every other type of mill a small town would ever need.

As a result of these mills and the jobs which they provided, a small settlement grew into a town of 6,000. Nine Mile Creek proved to be extremely important element in the development of Marcellus. While only a handful of mills are still operating on the creek today, Nine Mile is still proving to be a source of jobs and growth through its excellent fishing and magnetic natural beauty. ~

A motion to purchase a photocopy machine for the museum was passed authorizing the expenditure of up to \$500. No one volunteered to be on an election committee for our upcoming election. Folk artist James Parker spoke about the paintings he does of towns which organizations can then sell in many forms. Invited by Bill Reagan, Mr. Parker showed several examples of his work. Society members then voted to hire Mr. Parker to do a painting of Marcellus to be designed with the assistance of our members. ~

October 03, 1999 - General Meeting

A discussion took place on whether to have meetings on weeknights or Sundays. It was decided to hold meeting during Daylight Savings Time on weeknights and the rest on Sundays. A schedule will be devised so that all meetings will be during the same week of each month. Sidney and Mary Tuthill and Joyce Murphy volunteered to be on the holiday dinner committee and work to arrange the event (see related story on page 4). Members voted to purchase a color photocopy machine which is computer compatible for \$499. ~
