Roy Gallinger

Roy Gallinger, one time owner of the Marcellus Observer, was born in Kingston, Canada. His father, a brick layer and builder by trade, brought his family to the U.S. for better work opportunities. First they settled in Auburn and then in Syracuse before coming to Marcellus.

As a youngster, Roy's first paying job was playing coronet for a circus. He worked with his father to whom he attributed the skills he learned to build his own house in later years. Roy became involved with the Marcellus Observer when he was asked to write a column for it which he titled "The Ghost". In 1927, he purchased the paper and ran it through the difficult years of the depression and WW II. His weekly column "Rovin with Roy" was very popular. During WW II, Roy took a second job with the Baldwinsville Arsenal to support the paper and his family. He was a friend to all and especially to all Marcellus Veterans. Roy sent every veteran a weekly Marcellus Paper. What a morale booster that was!

In 1947, he sold the paper and in 1948, he and his wife moved to Norwich, N.Y. He continued his writing and published three books, the first "Oxcarts Along The Chenango", then "Campfires In The Forest" and his last, "Smoke Rings Over The Valley". He was state editor for the Syracuse Herald Journal, a position he accepted in 1958 and held until 1969.

Roy passed away in December 1971 in Norwich. He was predeceased by his wife, Mildred, who died in May 1971. He was survived by three sons, John M., Donald R., and Robert E. and two daughters, Mrs. Jean Madden and Mrs. Dorothy Marving. Also surviving were his brother, Lorne, and sister, Edna Copp.

Roy left his mark on Marcellus with his columns, his generous acts of kindness and his involvement in the community.

From John Curtin's book "Pucker Street" (p.349):

"In 1941, Roy Gallinger, the editor of *The Marcellus Observer*, captured the history of the Village of Marcellus and the spirit of its people in a poem that he quoted and is as valid today as it was over sixty years ago. Entitled **The Bridge Builder**, it sums up the role that individuals and families play as they face the challenges and decisions of their own generation and prepare for those that will follow."

This chasm that has been naught to me, To that fair-haired youth may a pitfall be. He, too, must cross in the twilight dim; Good friend, I am building the bridge for him."



From "Nine Mile Country" by Kathryn Heffernan:

In 1880 John N. Stearns, a native of Vermont, came to the village and opened a small drugstore in the Hooper block on North Street. Four years later, he moved into the new Gallup block, where a drug store continued to operate until the present building on East Main Street was built by Warren Rolen. (p.57)

Austin Marble was the proprietor of the pharmacy in the Knapp block (formerly the Gallup block) from 1904 until his death in 1914. Thereafter, Mrs. Marble carried on the business with the assistance of a pharmacist. (p.96)

In 1934 LeRoy Guernsey bought the drug business from Mrs. Austin Marble. Although there were four physicians in town at the time, Dr. C. E. Weidman, Dr. J. Russell Lowell, Dr. Joseph Walsh and Dr. Vernon Roth, Guernsey says there was little prescription business. The doctors supplied medication to their patients. Drug store records show that between 1884 and 1934 only three thousand prescriptions were filled, - an average of less than ten per month. To supplement his income from the sale of patent medicines and sick room supplies, Guernsey installed an ice cream machine. His soda fountain, with its marble counter and marble top tables, became a sort of social center. (p.108)

In 1967, Mr. Guernsey sold his pharmacy business to Warren C. Rolen, who continued to operate the store in the old post-office building until he moved into his new store at 11 East Main Street (in February 1973). (p.125)

Mr. Rolen closed the store in November of 2000 and Marcellus was without a pharmacy until the building was purchased by James Cataldi, who opened it as the Main Street Pharmacy of Marcellus in June of 2002. ~
