## Street Lighting in the Village of Marcellus By John P. Curtin April 2005

According to the Minutes of the Village Board of Trustees, as early as 1878, the Village Board agreed to install kerosene lamps and posts to illuminate Main Street. That same year, Michael Kennedy was hired to light the lamps, at a monthly salary of three dollars. In 1881, Belus F. North was hired to do the same and it appears that he continued in this role for a number of years. Several photos from the late 19th and early 20th centuries identify the location of several of these lamps

and posts, including that at the corner of North and Main as well as Cherry and Main. Another in front of the Alvord House is also evident.

It is said that the last person to light these types of lamps in the Village was James Powell, a long time employee of the Village who died in 1954.

In 1907, the Village Board of Trustees decided to add electric lighting to the Village and awarded a franchise, as well as a five-year contract, to Frank W. Knapp to light the Streets of the Village. Using arc lamps of modern construction and of twelve hundred-candlepower, Knapp agreed to light the streets from dusk until one a.m. and the first twelve street lamps were to be serviced for an annual charge of fifty dollars each and any additional lamps at a charge of forty dollars.

The Olde Home Days Celebration will be June 3rd, 4th and 5th with the museum open on Saturday the 4th. We look forward to seeing everyone then.



#### The Village Cemetery

The Marcellus Presbyterian Church is appealing to the community to help in the maintenance of the Village Cemetery by contributing to the permanent fund for upkeep and also to donate time or funds for the repair of damaged stones.

According to Kathryn C. Heffernan's NINE MILE COUNTRY (pp. 196-199), the first burial in Marcellus was in 1801 in a plot on South Street but in 1804 the 20 graves at that location were moved to the new cemetery adjacent to the meeting house at Main and North Streets. Early records were scarce until William J. Machan, the first President of the Village, made a map of the cemetery about 1850. More land was added through the years and in 1899 the iron fence was completed. In the same year, Belus F. North made another map using Machan's chart as a basis and showing 500 lots in addition to three sections labeled public grounds.

During the town's bicentennial, the community came together to repair the neglected history in our midst with fund raisers and "the stone gang" was organized to contribute labor. Dr. Joseph Centrone and his daughter, Betty, used the previous maps to develop a scale map showing the location of 2100 graves.

Starting in 1980, a group of dedicated people undertook a reading of all the stones in the cemetery and in 1986, Florence Coville Brock and Mary M. Losky published their efforts: THE MARCELLUS VILLAGE CEMETERY an Epigraphic Record 1980 - 1985. Entire inscriptions of every stone found were recorded and the locations noted relative to the maps of Belus F. North and Dr. Joseph Centrone.

Work has been done by some Boy Scout projects but unfortunately, time, weather and vandalism have again taken their toll on this historic site and that is why attention is again being drawn to the need for added support. The Marcellus Presbyterian Church has contacted local monument companies about stone repair and advice on doing stone repair. Several descendants of those interred in the cemetery have offered assistance and additional help is needed for those monuments no longer having connections to people in the area.





Earlier, in 1899, Knapp had contracted to have a small electric generating plant at the site of Robert Baker's sawmill on Nine Mile Creek. With electricity generated from waterpower at Baker's dam, the plant made possible sixteen street lamps in the village, plus in some business places and homes (Heffernan 84-85). Using the poles and wires that had been strung through the streets of the village a few years earlier by the Marcellus Telephone Company, and yet another Knapp enterprise, electric lights, using incandescent bulbs, replaced kerosene lamps along the village streets.





In 1912, the contract was renewed with Frank W. Knapp, and electric lights were evident on Main Street during the Old Home Days celebration of 1914. In 1917, after a period of ten years, Knapp assigned the lighting







franchise to the Marcellus Lighting Company, which would continue to light the streets during the 1920s. This company was merged with the Empire Gas and Electric, a holding company and predecessor of the New York State Electric and Gas Company in 1929 (Heffernan 85). It is this same company, commonly referred to NYSEG, which illuminates the streets of the Village today.

In 1931, the Village Board agreed that the installation of about thirty ornamental lights throughout the Village would help to beautify the Main Street, and for about twenty years, these would remain in place.





While they may have been ornamental, by the mid 1950s, many thought that the lights did not provide enough illumination, particularly over the major highways through the community, and the Board agreed (cl954) to the replacement of the ornamental lights with overhead lamps. The change to overhead lighting might also have been at the insistence of State and County Transportation Departments. Main Street is not only a State Road (Rte. 175) but also a County Highway (Rte. 41) and concern for highway safety may have prompted this mandate.





In 1967, the overhead lights would be changed from incandescent to mercury lighting so as to provide enhanced illumination. In recent years, the use of sodium rather than mercury in the overhead lights has provided even superior lighting throughout the Village.

In the spring of 2005, the overhead lights on Main Street will be replaced with 36 ornamental lights of sufficient illumination to light the Village and the highway - a costly and significant project conducted by and completed through the efforts of the Marcellus Betterment Association. It is thought that this project might even be extended to include more ornamental lights on some of the major feeder streets of the Village of Marcellus, especially North and South Streets.

The lights will reinforce the feeling of many in the community that Marcellus is what it has always been, a welcome home - a place that, from the top of East Hill or West Hill welcomes them home each night.  $\sim$
