The following article was extracted from one written by Lynda Wood in the Marcellus Observer of November 3, 1976:

John Drummond is a native of Fulton and lived for many years in Marcellus. He began his art career as a package designer for Sealright, Inc. in Fulton where he was a plate and proof artist, creating containers for dairy products. From an early age, John had acquired a flair for drawing cartoons and in his senior year of high school, he sold his first cartoon to **Parade** magazine. He also won an art scholarship but World War II intervened and after serving in the U.S. Navy, he attended Layton School of Art in Milwaukee for a year but became discouraged with their teaching methods and returned to Fulton. His next move was to New Rochelle, New York where he worked for Paul Terry of Terrytoons as a tracer and opaquer. After a year, John left to attend Marietta College in Ohio, where he studied English and drama, but discovered that most of his time was being spent "Painting stage scenery instead of acting" so he decided the theater wasn't for him.

A friend suggested that several jobs in the art field were available in Iowa so John moved again but ended up working for a department store drawing furniture. It was there that he met his future wife, Jill, a fashion illustrator with the same store, who was a native of Birmingham, Alabama and a graduate of Auburn University. In her spare time, Jill taught dancing at the Fred Astaire studio and they asked her to paint murals on the walls of a new studio. Since John had considerable experience at painting stage scenery, she asked for his help and by the time the mural was finished, they decided to marry.

Shortly after they were married, John landed a position at Iowa State College at Ames as a publications artist and in this capacity, he served as art advisor and artist for the college-owned commercial television station and the motion picture film unit. After two years at Iowa State, the couple returned to upstate New York where John joined the Heavy Military Electronics Department of the General Electric Company as a design and layout publications specialist responsible for complete art production of proposals, brochures and instruction books. The position also included the production of political cartoons for GE news media, plus slides and movies.

After eight years at General Electric, John left to return to freelance work. Jill did fashion illustration for various Syracuse stores including the Addis Co.,

BRIEF SKETCHES OF EARLY AND LATER TIMES IN MARCELLUS

History of Marcellus Falls Mills Continued. The first Saw Mill, the Grist and Flouring Mill on the Same Site.

FIFTEENTH PAPER

(Continuing from the last Newsletter)

Soon after the mill was put in running order, Crane sold out his interest to Zerah Shepard, and in the trade took the Dodge farm, near the Lime Ledge. The mill was a common custom mill, and drew custom for many miles about. Shepard and Platt sold out their interest to Sandford C. Parker and George Talbot about 1831. From 1831 to 1859 there were a number of owners, for the property changed hands several times. During this interval we learn that it was owned, or run, by Leonard Mason & Co., Osmond & Gibbs, Reuben Parsons and Elijah Weston, Deacon Isaac Hill of Memphis, Joel Lee and William Osmond. January 1st 1850 Wm. Osmond bought it of Hill and owned it till October, 1852, when it went back to Hill on foreclosure, Osmond losing several thousand dollars in the deal. Then followed Samuel Gilley, who run it a few years, followed by Goodell and Hibbard, until about 1859, when William F. Gere came into possession of it and run it until about 1863, when it was bought by Fisher and Burnett. They run it together about one year, and Burnett dropped out and Fisher continued to run it until 1867 and sold it to John F. Jones, who after a time sold it to Johnson and Doe.

While this firm owned it, on November 5, 1894, about noon, a fire broke out in the barn adjacent to the mill, and although the south wind was blowing a perfect gale, it swept the mill and three buildings just south of the mill, two belonging to T. Jefferson Herring, and one to Edward Steele. Also to the north the blacksmith and machine shop of Truman Eggleston, the large woolen factory that stood where the pearl barley mill now stands, and the dwelling

house on the hill still farther north, owned by Mrs. Cornelia Eggleston, widow of Hiram Eggleston. The gristmill was promptly rebuilt on a much larger scale by Byron C. Johnson, James Sarr having charge of the carpenter work, and also helped put in the machinery, the most of which came from Cortland Foundry & Machine Co. Johnson being unable to fulfill his contracts, turned over his interest to the Cortland Foundry & Machine Co., and they sold to R. B. Rollo & Rathbun Brothers. This firm sold to H. C. Smith in January, 1878, who, after running it till October 1, 1880, rented it to G. L. Wells for a year or more.

During the fall of 1881 the mill was enlarged and remodeled and the roller process was introduced, it being the first of the E. P. Allis System east of Rochester at an expense of about \$10,000. Ten rollers nine inches by eighteen inches, were introduced, rendering it 125 barrel capacity. After this general remodeling, later on the capacity was increased to 200 barrels in twenty-four hours by the addition of six sets of rollers nine by thirty inches with other corresponding purifiers, etc. February 1, 1882, the copartnership of H. C. Smith & Co. was formed. This firm carried on a large business for nearly ten years, running the mill a great deal of the time night and day, employing twelve hands. C. F. Scheffer was principal bookkeeper for several years, and the late Harvey Wells, first miller, and T. J. Devan of Utica, general traveling agent. They also employed a considerable part of the time, two millrights to keep in thorough repair the machinery, and to introduce from time to time such new machinery as they might need to keep abreast of the times and the demand.

They had facilities to use all the wheat grown in the vicinity, which supplied about one-fourth of their need, and the balance was brought by railroad from the western part of the state, Buffalo, Toledo, Detroit and Duluth, Minn. Along at first they used all winter wheat but the demand for hard wheat increased so rapidly that they began to run about one-third of the time on Minnesota hard wheat, making the best quality of Minnesota patent flour. Their custom work and exchange system covered a territory of six to ten miles. The local trade, including Syracuse, took about half of their product, and the remainder was distributed along the line of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad.

Dey Brothers and the former Edward's Department Store to help support their three daughters. John then enjoyed teaching commercial art at BOCES in Auburn where he stayed for eight years before freelancing again. During his sixth year at BOCES, he participated in a teacher exchange program which enabled the family to spend a year in England while he taught at Bristol Polytechnic. They enjoyed the experience and found that the scenery - similar to upstate New York in some ways - offered many painting opportunities.

Back in Marcellus, John concentrated on his watercolors and traveling to art shows from Rochester to Florida and occasionally Greenwich Village to display his work. He has sold his cartoons over the years to The New Yorker, McCall's, Good Housekeeping, American Legion, Boy's Life, Parade, TV Guide and many others. He has taken courses at Syracuse and Columbia Universities and has demonstrated his post-Impressionist technique at the New York State Fair, the Skaneateles Art Guild, Associated Artists, and other art groups.
