



The New Pucker Street, Since 1953

About the Book

A companion book to *Pucker Street, the First 100 Years*, this second volume continues to document the civic activity of the community of Marcellus from 1953 to the present. On the cover is The Steadman House – an enduring symbol of the community's history, but also announcing its presence in the 21st century. Its steps and pillars are inviting and seem to announce that Marcellus, while retaining its authenticity, is ever adapting to change, responsible change that is reflected in the lives and accomplishments of its citizens, young and senior.

The New Pucker Street documents many of the changes that have taken place in Marcellus since the celebration of the Village Centennial in 1953. In the last fifty years, the traditional picture of Marcellus as an agricultural and milling community changed. Many old homes and buildings in the Village have fallen to the wrecker's ball, while other landmarks have been remodeled to a former glory. As more families moved to the suburbs after the war, there would be an increase in the population dramatically changing the make-up of the native people – reflected particularly in the school population. In the

next fifty years, the role of government would change, as more services would be provided, and an aging infrastructure required attention by elected representatives.

The next fifty years would see the emergence of the "greatest generation." When the young men returned to Marcellus after the war, they were joined by equally involved women of that generation, and in the words of President George H. W. Bush, "did the work of democracy day by day, every day in their hometown", helping to build bridges to the 21st century – ones that their own children, grandchildren and great grandchildren would follow.

The New Pucker Street also details some of the issues facing an American village in modern times, and it contains an epilogue, highlighting some lessons that might be learned from the past – ones that might serve as guidelines for what lies ahead.

The New Pucker Street portrays Marcellus like many small towns across America – as home – a place where many people stay, and to which many people return. They return because it is home, and they always feel welcome.

On December 29, 1882 West Onondaga Subordinate Grange #464 received its charter from National Grange. There were fourteen charter members with the names of Ball, Durant, Adams, Stevens, Cornwell, and Higgins. Family names listed in later years of membership include Dorchester, Baker, Olney, Curtis, Henderson, May, Bartlet, Springstead, Hamilton, Coon, Freeman, Harrison, Black, Steele, Gallinger, Gooden, Lader, Sweet, Chapman, Crysler, Oliver, Tripp, Brown and Munro.

The Grange was formed following the Civil War as an assist to farmers who were struggling with the economic restlessness and discontent resulting from economic changes of the time. It became the social and progressive thinking media of many communities. The Grange claims success in controlling the railroad monopoly costs restricting shipment of crops. It was influential in obtaining Rural Free Delivery of the US Mail throughout the country. An

insurance program for farmers became one of many local advantages. Dances, dinners, farming practices, and education filled many a meeting discussion. Grange was the first secret society to include women into full and equal membership.

On January 1, 1928 the local name was changed to Marcellus Grange as the village was the central meeting place, and the post office of most members. Marcellus Grange was meeting twice a month in Parsons Hall.

In 1932 a lot was purchased at 15 West Main Street and a hall was built. Members, aided by a local contractor, supplied all the labor and material for the building. On February 25, 1933 the Grange building was dedicated and the 50th anniversary was celebrated by members and friends. The mortgage for the building was burned in 1948.

There are four levels of Grange membership: Local (Subordinate), County (Pomona), State and National. A local member takes four degrees based on teachings of agriculture. Each of the other levels includes another degree. At each meeting there is an open Bible and all members salute the American Flag. At present there are 244 Granges in New York State. The Granges in Camillus, Skaneateles, Mandana, and Shepherd Settlement have closed and are now members of Marcellus Grange.

In 1928 a Juvenile Grange was formed for children ages 5 to 14. They elect the same officers and hold meetings following parliamentary procedure, the same as the Subordinate Grange. Later the name was changed to Junior Grange. The State and National Grange supply guidelines and projects. Juniors earn merit badges for their efforts. Each summer the New York State Grange sponsors a week long camping experience for the Juniors.

All Granges in the county are part of Onondaga Pomona Grange. They meet four times a year at different Grange halls. New York State Grange and National Grange each meet once a year, and each has its own headquarters building. Each Grange has committees for Legislation, Community Service, Family Activities and Sports. The emphasis this year is Emergency Preparedness, Health Care, and Local SPCA. There are also writing, photography, craft and cooking contests for all ages.

Marcellus Grange today is oriented to providing community service. Each year dictionaries are given to the third grades of Marcellus and South Onondaga schools; Marcellus third graders visit Fesko's Discovery Center for a day of learning about agriculture. For the past eleven years ladies have met at the Grange hall every Thursday from October through April to make sleeping bags for the homeless. Ninety bags were made this year and given to the Salvation Army and Rescue Mission. Inside each bag is placed handcrafted mittens, hat and scarf, plus toiletries, socks, sweater and a devotional book. In addition, about thirty people from the community make baby quilts, preemie hats, lap robes, shawls, procedure dolls, and also walker, wheelchair and catheter bags, which are given to agencies within the county. Marcellus Grange has received State and National recognition for their Community Service reports.

Marcellus Grange meets the second Friday evening of each month. Everyone is welcome to become a Grange member - Please ask a member. The current officers are: Master, Mary Widger; Overseer, James Hamilton; Lecturer, Ed Nelson; Steward, Earl Brothers; Ass't Steward, Richard Bailer; Chaplain, Gladys Nelson; Treasurer, Bruce Widger; Secretary, Roberta Harrison; Gatekeeper, Charlene Woods; Ceres, Connie Bealer; Pomona, Elsie Harrison; Flora, Eleanor Grinnell; Lady Ass't. Brief Sketches of Early and Later Times in Marcellus by Rev. A. Roe

Further History of Old and Late Stores and

Merchants in Marcellus

TWENTY-EIGHTH PAPER

The building next to the Marquises store, now owned by Mark Haney, is an old building nearly or quite four score years old, and was originally built for a store by Joseph Goodwin, father of the late Miles Goodwin, who occupied it sometime as a store.

Since which time it has changed owners and occupants many times. For many years, it was used for a dwelling by different ones, viz, Addison Famham, S. M. Griffin, A. W. Beach, and possibly others. In 1874, J. V. Palmer opened a drug store in the front part, and Dr. Richards, who afterwards moved to Rochester, was somewhat interested with him awhile. He was a physician here, coming from Camillus, and had an office at his residence, where Mrs. Searles now lives. Later Mrs. Bicknell had a millinery store in this building, and later still Dr. Northway had an office in it. It has since been used for a saloon, hotel and dwelling.

The building on the comer of Main and Cherry streets was built by Thomas J. Field, one of the early merchants here. He had not occupied this store long before he failed in business, and the building passed into the hands of Lincoln Chapman, who was somewhat involved in the failure of Field. Walter Bradley came into possession of it later on though Moses and Dalliba occupied it four or five years after Field and then moved into the Sayre store. Then came Bartlett, Bradley & Co., from Auburn about 1839 and carried on a general store for a short time, and they were succeeded by Isaac Bradley, who had been a clerk for his partners some three years previous in Auburn. Mr. Bradley conducted the store here five years and then moved into what has long been known as the DeCoudres store, which he built, it being completed about 1844.

Peter Thompson, his father-in-law, came from Skaneateles and superintended the work, and he was assisted by J. C. Sayre. Mr. Sayre moved here soon after, and later built the old school house on Cherry street, and also the Presbyterian church. Mr. Bradley carried on a drug store, also a general store in this new building nine years, and then exchanged the property with Hamilton White of Syracuse, for some Oswego county lands.

This store was then occupied by Greenman & King as a drug store and patent medicines. They carried on a large business, and kept several teams on the road selling medicines. Isaac Bradley was an important factor as bookkeeper and financial agent. Job Moses and John Lyman were traveling agents. Moses afterwards lived and died in Rochester. John Lyman is now living in Syracuse and said to be wealthy. Caleb Cowles, jr. succeeded the above firm and carried on a drug store a while or until he failed, and was succeeded by John North who did not carry on the business long before he gave it up and was succeeded by Thomas DeCoudres, who came here from Dryden, Tompkins county, a man successful in business and universally respected, who conducted the store about twenty-five years either alone or in partnership with his son, Henry, until his death, and later with his son, Fred, until his own death in 1885. Not long after his death the firm became DeCoudres & Baker for a year or two. Then DeCoudres & Son for several years until they closed out the business and moved to Syracuse.

After Isaac Bradley left the comer store, it was occupied for some years by different parties for different purposes when it was not vacant. Along during the war it was used to store wool, sort beans, for tobacco and cigar making, etc. John Griffin occupied this store for several years, and then it came into the hands of William H. Julia who took in J. W. Reed as a partner for a year or so and then J. W. Reed ran a market and grocery store awhile, and finally W. H. Sarr took the grocery part and R. A. Julia the market part. After a year and a half, James Sarr succeeded W. H. Sarr, until he moved across the way in the Gallup Block, and R. A. Julia continued some years until succeeded by Hickman & Walsh, and they by George Hickman, the present proprietor. Sarr was followed by M. B. VanVranken, and he by Van Vranken & Thompson, and they by F. A. Thompson, the enterprising dealer now in the "little corner grocery," as he calls it. ~
