VISITS HIS ORE MINES.

S. G. Hooper Writes of Mexican Trip to His Investment, and Hunting Life.

Cuatro Cienegas, Coah, Feb. 19, '12.

To the Editor of the Observer:

When I contributed a short letter from Mexico you spoke of me as your war correspondent. You might like to offer my friends there something in time of peace. For accounts of the trouble here are greatly exaggerated and I think the present government will be a success.

I left New York Jan. 26 for this place of 4,000 people, houses of adobe, very cool in summer, as natives wet the dirt floors. In winter the misery is awful. My first few days here they had 3 inches of snow and very cold. They do not provide any way of heating nor bathing. This place is noted for its vineyards and fine wine, also as a buying center for Guayuie, a wild weed worth \$130 a ton, yielding 20 percent, fine rubber, and millions have been made in it.

I have just returned from a 3-day shooting trip in the mountains, worth describing. Mr. Alexander Floyd, born here, but an American, was my companion. He knows the country well. We left here after an early breakfast, our outfit a 4 mule team and driver, a moso (man servant), supplies, utensils, guns. After riding 35 miles, at "The Abra" (a cut) we camped for the night. Having little to eat during the day, when Floyd said supper I was ready. I did not know that cornmeal mixed with water and greases, baked in a covered pan, could be so good. After this we fed and "staked" the animals and about 9 got into our sleeping bags. It didn't seem to me I had been asleep 10 minutes when Floyd gave me a dig in the ribs and said, "Listen, have you ever heard a mountain lion scream? Well you have something coming to you." The few remaining hairs I have stood on end. It seemed to me I got minutes more sleep and was called to a red-hot breakfast.

Then we started up the mountain to see a mine we own, and incidentally to kill, if possible, a deer. To

describe this country is beyond me. I have never seen such a glorious sight. We kept going up, up, and by noon were 7,000 feet high. We stopped about an hour to rest and feed. Then after another 1,000 feet we had to leave the horses and go on foot. We found the ore deposit and brought samples with us.

The downward trip was, if possible, even more interesting, as the view across the valleys and canyons was wonderful. I took some fine photographs and will have the pleasure of showing them to friends there. We got back to the horses and were about an hour from camp when Floyd motioned to me to dismount. We left the horses and went around a point of rocks. There in the valley, about 200 feet below, were two deer feeding. We both shot at the buck, as we did not want to take chances of not getting any. Both shots took effect so we came into camp with a fine deer. Floyd dressed it and we had venison steak. I don't remember of ever eating a meal that tasted any better. The next day we went over other mountains but did not get near enough to shoot another deer. While exploring some caves I saw a big owl, so far away I had no idea I could hit him. I did, though, and the moso went after him, but Mr. Owl had dined on skunk so we could not save the wings as intended.

On the trip home we crossed a stream full of trout, and I expect to have a day or so fishing and then about two days duck shooting. This is certainly a wonderful country, lots of things waiting for Americans to develop. I want to go down the west coast of Mexico and expect to be in New York by March 1. With regards to you and my friends.

Note: Samuel G. Hooper was the grandson of Samuel C. Hooper who came to Marcellus in 1848 from England where he had been trained as a cabinet maker. His home and shop were on the west side of North Street. About 1880 he opened a furniture factory with William Gallup just west of the creek on East Main Street (Kathryn C. Heffernan's "Nine Mile Country").

Samuel C. Hooper also served as a village trustee in the 1870s (John P. Curtin's "Pucker Street"). ~




Revisiting Heath's Grove

"Margaret Ward Elected Queen at 54th Annual Six-Town Picnic Event" read the headline. A beautiful young lady with dark hair next to Miss Ward piqued the curiosity of my siblings. Peeking at the caption, they read the following: "Pretty Margaret Ward smiles her appreciation at being selected as Queen of the 1939 Six-Town Picnic. Shirley Bobbett, left, and Jane Hallas, right, were runners up for the honor." Stunned by the caption, they stared at each other in disbelief. It was a picture of our mother-Shirley Bobbett!!! She never mentioned this accolade, but given my mother's genuine humility, I am not surprised. Her memories of Heath's Grove fascinated Picturesque cabins on Otisco Lake... square dances.... beauty pageants... baseball games.... celebrity visits; It had a magical quality. grandmother, Lena Heath Bobbett, reminisced many times about Heath's Grove. Talk to Your Horse

Talk to your horse and teach him to obey your voice as well as the reins. This may prove valuable if, as sometimes happens, the lines break or become unbuckled. Besides, the horse likes the sociability of it. He easily learns a dozen or more words, but be careful to use them only for exactly what you mean. For instance, "whoa" means to stop at once and stand perfectly still; "get up" to go straight ahead and at once; "back" to step backward; "easy" or "steady", to slow up.

These words the horse readily learns and takes kindly to. "Walk", means to change at once to a walk; and "all right", spoken in a calm, reassuring tone, means "don't be afraid, that won't hurt you", and it is wonderful to see what a calming effect it has. Speak firmly but not sharply to the horse, for they are nervous creatures. Talking to your horse will make him more intelligent and more friendly.
