

Marcellus Observer July 5, 1912 Class of Nine Graduated

An interesting program and lively class of nine members of the Marcellus High School finished their course of study, associations and round of pleasures, with the formalities and fun of commencement week. The class members were:

Sunday evening Alvord Hall was largely filled with the class and their friends to hear Rev. Clune, among the best known among the Syracuse clergy, give religious admonition upon this turning point in the young people's lives. The sermon was received with attentive interest, and the clergyman was thanked for his influence among our people.

Monday night was Class Cracks, a joke-cracking feast among the class members to whom each number is supposed to be as much of a surprise as to their friends assembled to enjoy the personal allusions. Each participant did full justice to his or her assignment. The program follows: Class Night

From The President ...

Things have been buzzing at the Steadman House this spring and summer. The second grade and fourth grade classes toured in June with thanks for the help of Pat and Charlie Sanborn, Amy North and Jean Nightingale for being guides. We also welcomed the MCS classes of 1950 and 1962.

We had many visitors on Olde Home Days and had a float in the parade put together by Pat and Charlie Sanborn and towed by Jim Thorpe. Since January 1st, there have been 390 people tour the Steadman House during our regular hours and by request for special times and for research.

In July, security cameras were installed with donations given in memory of Joe Nolan. The second coat of pavement was put on the parking lot and the driveway was sealed. We will be replacing the lights on our roadside sign in the near future (they have been vandalized twice).

From January 1st through July 31st, 935 volunteer hours have been donated to the Historical Society at the Steadman House to cover visiting hours, cleaning, working on displays, cataloging acquisitions and newsletter preparation - plus many hours of work done at home by Pat, Hollis and myself.




Lewis Steadman and Peg Nolan at the Open House with c.1780-1820 American-made rifle.

Giles Garage

While rearranging and making some new displays in the garage, I came upon a sign that reads "Giles Garage". Information taped to the sign indicates that the owners were Roy and Eva Giles. The garage was located on East Main Street in what is now a double house just east of the Masonic Temple. Apparently they rented the garage to Kneeland Dorchester and Ed Shay from 1929-1935 and then sold the property to Engler. Edgar Bartlett and Glen Thompson ran the garage was made into a double house. It was bought by Kenneth and Bessie Case and remained in their possession until Bessie (Elizabeth) Case died in 1987.

The only information I could find on Roy and Eva Giles was that they were married June 1915 in Syracuse. "Leroy" M. Giles, age 20 (perhaps should have been 30), and Eva F. Giles, age 22, are listed on the 1920 Marcellus Federal Census but the 1925 State Census lists "Le Roy" N. Giles, age 34, and Eva Giles, age 26, as living in Elbridge with Le Roy's parents, Charles and Edith Giles. On the 1930 Federal Census, Leroy Giles, age 40, and Eva Giles, age 33, are shown in Elbridge. Does anyone have any information on these people?



Frank Griffing

Frank Griffing was born in Bordino in 1879 and his family moved to Marcellus in 1890. In 1895, he learned shoe-making from his uncle and in 1898 he brought his grandfather's cobbler's bench to Marcellus (see picture at right). His weekly column "Marcellus Memories" appeared for many years in the Marcellus Observer. Frank died in 1974 at age 95. *Note: See Peg Nolan's article in Volume 6, Issue 1 of the Newsletter (Winter 2001).*

Coon Family History

Daniel G. Coon was born in Jefferson County and came to Marcellus about 1842. He joined partners Norton, Parker and Olney in running a distillery at Marcellus Falls. At a later date he bought out Norton and Parker and the business became Coon and Olney. The distillery was a successful business for 25 years. In 1853 he bought what became known as the "Coon Farm" on South Street. He was elected trustee of the village in 1853 and elected President of the village in 1858, 1859, 1874, 1878, 1879 and 1880. He and his wife, Betsey Barney Coon, remained in the home until their deaths: his in 1893 and hers in 1896.

Their son, Daniel DeForest Coon was born in Marcellus in 1848. He attended Marcellus schools and Cazenovia Seminary. Upon finishing school, he went into the cheese business and then the drug business. After a couple of years, he went into farming on the 130 acre family farm on South Street. In 1899 he constructed a dam across the brook on his property for harvesting ice. He started "Spring Brook Ice" to sell for private and business use. In later years, Coon's Pond became a skating rink for village residents. Daniel DeForest Coon and his wife, Lucy Rhodes Coon had a son, Daniel Rhodes Coon, who bought the homestead in 1924 and continued farming and truck gardening.

In 1925, Daniel Rhodes Coon started Coon's Greenhouse and sold all kinds of plants and flowers. Daniel Rhodes Coon died in 1931 and upon Daniel DeForest Coon's death in 1938, the business became Coon and Masters and later, Clarence, the son of Daniel Rhodes Coon and his wife, Ella, bought out his uncle (Masters) and ran the floral business.

Clarence Coon sold the business to William Crysler in 1955 and in 1957, the business closed and Clarence took the greenhouse down. Clarence worked at Norris Funeral Home for 50 years, retiring in 1985. He was also superintendent of Highland Cemetery, past chief of the Marcellus Fire Dept. and a member of the Marcellus United Methodist Church. Clarence died in 1988 and is buried in Highland Cemetery. His widow, Lulu, and son, Daniel, live in Marcellus today.
