#### REQUEST FOR SUPPORT

The Marcellus Historical Society (MHS) was founded in 1960 and is chartered by the New York State Education Department. The MHS Constitution states: "The purpose of the organization shall be: to foster the study of the history of the original Township of Marcellus, NY; to collect historical records and artifacts pertaining to the original township; to maintain a location for these materials to be preserved, displayed and available for study by the public; and to thereby keep alive the heritage of the community."

The MHS, *operated entirely by volunteers* and governed by an elected Executive Committee of four officers and six trustees, is headquartered in the Steadman House located at 18 North Street in the village of Marcellus. In November of 2006, the membership of the MHS approved the transfer of the Steadman House as a gift from its owners, Lewis and Alma Steadman. The House was built circa 1833 by Dr. Lake I. Tefft and consists of ten rooms on three floors. The Joanne Robinson Research Room contains: census records dating from 1800 along with birth, marriage and death indices; cemetery records; family genealogies; files for local businesses, organizations and the Marcellus Central School District; over 6,800 labeled and inventoried photographs and 66 scrapbooks with more than 53,000 indexed articles. The remaining rooms display the approximately 5,000 artifacts relating to the history of the Town of Marcellus. A computerized inventory is constantly updated as additional items are donated.

Free guided tours of the house and the adjacent garage, which includes a display of agricultural artifacts, are offered Thursdays (1PM-4PM) and Sundays (1PM-3PM) except for the second Sunday from September through June when a regular meeting of the Society is usually held. The meetings, which are open to all, consist of a short business meeting followed by a program featuring a guest speaker and ending with refreshments. Tours of the House are also available by appointment. For more information, please explore our website at: **mhs.villageofmarcellus.com**.

For several years, the MHS has maintained a membership of over 400 individuals and 30 businesses who receive our regular quarterly newsletter. However, the dues (\$5 for individuals and \$25 for businesses) do not provide enough income to cover all of the expenses involved with maintaining the Steadman House and our collection. Membership is required for voting at our business meetings and to become a member of the Executive Committee. Members also have free access to our files and records for research - however, membership dues are not considered a donation for tax purposes. The membership records are not given or sold to other individuals or organizations.

Fortunately we do have dedicated members who regularly make donations to support the Society, but for five out of the last six years our expenses have exceeded our income - which has prompted us to conduct a major fundraising campaign to ensure that we remain financially stable. The Marcellus Historical Society is a non-profit organization as described under Section 501(c)(3) and 509(a)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code and your tax deductible monetary donation will assist the Executive Committee in addressing and fulfilling the organization's mission statement by facilitating: (1) the purchasing of materials to preserve the records and artifacts, (2) the continued maintenance of the Steadman House, garage and grounds (i.e., monthly and routine expenses of supporting a historical facility), and (3) the updating of computer hardware and software. All contributions are acknowledged with a letter stating the amount and date of the donation to a legitimate non-profit organization.

Whether or not you are a member, please consider making a donation to the Marcellus Historical Society to support our "mission". An individual who donates \$100 or more will be granted a Sustaining Membership (5 years) and a person donating \$500 or more may be eligible for a Life Membership.



#### Dr. Vernon E. Roth

Dr. Vernon E. Roth was a physician in Marcellus for thirty-five years, coming to Marcellus in 1933. Dr. Roth was born in Shelby, Mich., and came to New York State at the age of nine when his family moved to Clifton Springs. He was a Phi Beta Kappa at Syracuse University and graduated magna cum laude from the SU School of Medicine in 1932 after which he spent one year as a resident physician at St. Joseph's Hospital in Syracuse.

He had his first office on North Street in the house that later became the Methodist Church Parsonage (at the corner of Paul Street). After buying the house on Reed Street, he made an office there and his wife worked as his receptionist and nurse for some time. During WW II, he served in the Army Medical Corps with the rank of Major. For many years he specialized in obstetrics but he gave this up to-practice general medicine.

In 1955 Dr. Roth built the Marcellus Medical Center on Orange Street and in time, Dr. John Rury and Dr. Lance Osadshey joined the practice. He was active in town and village affairs, and served for many years as Town Health Officer and School Health Officer. He was a member of Alpha Omega Alpha, a medical honor society, Alpha Kappa Kappa Medical Fraternity, the Onondaga Medical Society, the American Medical Association and the American Academy of General Practice and in 1960 he was asked to present a paper to the International College of Medical Practice in Salzburg, Austria.

For many years he was on the staff of St. Joseph's

Hospital and later on the staff of Community Hospital. In 1969, due to his health, Dr. Amado S. Santos took over his practice.

Dr. Roth died February 26, 1969 and was laid to rest at Highland Cemetery. His wife, Thelma Donaldson Roth, passed away in 1972. They had one daughter and three grandchildren.

**Dr. John Rury**, age 32, joined Dr. Vernon Roth's medical practice in 1955. He was from Baldwinsville and a former GI who was a resident physician at St. Joseph's Hospital in Syracuse. He practiced in Marcellus for about eight years and then returned to St. Joseph's. Later he was chosen for the "Who's Who" of Medical Specialists while practicing in Plattsburg, New York.

<u>Dr. Roger G. Daly</u> moved to Marcellus from Minoa in 1962 and had his office at 42 East Main Street. He was a native of Ellenburg Depot, Clinton County, and a graduate of Syracuse University and the Upstate Medical Center in 1955. After an internship at St. Joseph's Hospital, he served as a Captain in the Medical Corps, serving two years in Germany. Dr. Daly ended his practice in Marcellus in March of 1975.

Marcellus Observer July 1962, March 1975

<u>Dr. Lance Osadhsey</u> joined Dr. Vernon Roth's medical practice in 1966. He was a native of Homer, New York and a graduate of Upstate Medical School in Syracuse. Before coming to Marcellus, he was an intern at Packard Hospital, in Sayre for a year and then joined the U.S. Army as a captain and battalion surgeon for the 82nd airborne division of paratroopers.

<u>Dr. Amado S. Santos</u> took over Dr. Roth's practice in 1969. He was a native of the Philippines and graduated from St. Thomas College in Manila. He did his residency and post-graduate work in St. Louis and Milwaukee and also attended Queens College in Kingston, Ontario before coming to Community-General Hospital in 1967. Dr. Santos also opened an office in Solvay and then in Camillus before retiring from private practice in 2004.

# Marcellus Observer February 20, 1948 Stories of Marcellus Business

### Many Advancements in Farm Machinery Noted At Nightingale's, After 60 Years in Business

It was 60 years ago—in the year 1883 to be exact—that William Nightingale, Jr., father of the present Nightingale brothers, looked over the plot of ground a mile south of Marcellus and decided that a grist mill on that spot would serve the farmers of the community.

The place didn't look like it does today. About where the mill stands was an old tannery, and a house stood on the site of the present house. Today, part of the original house has been pushed back and is now a shed, directly back of the house. The rest of the structure was remodeled into a home, and it was there that the Nightingale family of children was born.

William Nightingale, Jr. (his father was William, Sr.) died about 20 years ago, and many times he has told that during the first year of operation the profit of the grist mill was a dollar a week. William Nightingale's father, William, Sr., originally built a sawmill on the creek bank at what now is the Bryden-Schmidt property on Cherry Valley Turnpike, and that was long before even oil lamps were invented. Indeed, the elder Nightingale was first in these parts to purchase an oil lamp and a gallon of coal oil.

In the history books the name of Florence Nightingale, the famous nurse of long ago and the founder of the Red Cross, is hailed with the honor due one of her accomplishments. This writer learned for the first time that the famous Florence Nightingale was a first cousin of William Nightingale, Sr., the man who built the sawmill by the creek, therefore would have been a third cousin to the present generation of Marcellus Nightingales.

When William Nightingale, Jr., died a score of years ago, the three sons; John, Merson and Harold

took the mill over. Merson had been associated with his father before the elder Nightingale died, and now his two brothers joined him in the business. All three boys had a thorough understanding of the milling business and each had served his time in the hard, muscular work connected with it.

Although ambitious and imbued with the urge to expand, the boys were a level headed trio and started slowly. With the coming of the tractor they saw an opportunity to serve the farmers better, so built a garage and took on a tractor dealership. Other lines followed as the boys saw the need of them, until today a farmer can stop at Nightingale's and fill most of his farm needs, besides having his grist run through and filling up with gas.

With the coming of oil heat the Nightingales were quick to seize this opportunity. They already had gasoline connections and were one of the leading gas dealers in the county. This led to the easy acquisition of oil contracts, and today they have become an outstanding fuel oil source for this part of the county.

From the modest beginning of 60 years ago, the Nightingale Mills now has several major departments, with competent men managing each. The fuel oil and gas department is handled by James Ryan; the pump department by Roy Edinger; the farm machinery department is managed by John Nightingale, Jr.; tires and accessories are the department of Horace Crysler; Merson Nightingale is in charge of the mill; Harold the garage and John is busy keeping the accounting department functioning. Each man has the assistants necessary for his job.

Besides the multitudinous stock of farm tools and gadgets, Nightingales carry phosphate, cement, lime, wallboard, poultry litter, paints, nails, hardware, tools, rope freezers, refrigerators, and a hundred other articles. They also do welding, thawing of frozen pipes and repairing of almost every kind.

This year marks the 60th anniversary of the establishment that has grown to be one of the leading businesses of Marcellus. It employs 20 people, most of them local. Not once has the firm marred its name for fair and honest dealing, and even though it has grown large the owners have not lost their connection with the farmer, the man who tills the soil. Customers are still called by their first names and their families are known to the Nightingales. This democratic spirit prevailing in a large business of this kind can only strengthen the bond of trust and friendship between customer and owner, and has much to do with the Nightingale success story. ~
