




History of The Finger Lakes Telephone Corp.

The first telephone in Marcellus was a public pay station installed by the Central Telephone Company of Syracuse in 1895. It was installed in a barber shop located on the South side of Reed Street just off of North Street. This small building later served as Dr. Joseph Walsh's office and is still standing. This telephone stood about six feet tall with a long goose neck transmitter and a wet cell battery box made of butternut wood.

In 1903, Frank Knapp, a prominent local attorney, started the Marcellus Telephone Company as an Independent (of the Bell System) Telephone Company solely owned by him. The Marcellus Telephone Company began with sixteen subscribers all on one telephone line extending from Marcellus to Marcellus Falls. Some of the subscribers were: Mr. Knapp, The First National Bank, The Crown Woolen Mills, the Moir family, The Onondaga Paper Company, the Lawless family, Mr. Allen V. Smith and Mr. Roy Smith.

In 1925, James A. Clary, Sr. purchased the company from Mr. Knapp and in January of 1926 incorporated it as The Finger Lakes Telephone

Corporation serving 425 subscribers. Mr. Clary was a former New York Telephone Company employee who left the Company in the early 1920's and purchased the telephone company in Vernon, New York. His intention was to operate both companies, but late in 1926, his health broke and he sold Vernon. He died in 1927, at the age of 34, of cancer which developed from injuries incurred while serving in the Signal Corps of the U. S. Army during World War I.

His widow, Mary A. Clary, decided to continue running the company, which she did during the Depression and World War II. Mrs. Clary also was a former New York Telephone Company employee who started as an operator in Auburn, New York and, upon marriage, resigned as a Supervisor of Chief Operators in New York City.

From 425 subscribers when Mr. Clary purchased the company in 1925, the number dropped to 360 in 1932 as a result of the Depression. During these years, growth was very slow, but the service rendered by the telephone operators was very personal. If a caller could not remember the called party's telephone number, all he/she had to do was give the name of the called party and the operator would complete the call.

Another service that the operators performed was to ring the Village Fire Siren upon the report of a fire in the Community and then direct the Volunteer firemen to the scene of the fire. This service was provided free of charge to the Community until 1952 when the Company converted to an automatic dial system.



As a result of these services, stacks of five pound boxes of candy were given to the operators by local businessmen at Christmas time and Jim Clary, Jr. enjoyed them very much.

Between 1940 and 1942, Mrs. Clary made arrangements to acquire the two rural telephone companies which served the communities of Rose Hill and Borodino respectively. Telephone lines were completely rebuilt and the Communities' magnets service was restored. In 1947, a satellite dial office was built between the two communities so that those rural areas had dial service five years before Marcellus did.

In 1950, after service in the U. S. Navy during World War II and graduation from Holy Cross College, James A. Clary, Jr. returned to Marcellus and assumed management of the Company.

It was immediately obvious to Clary that the entire telephone system had to be completely rebuilt and converted to a dial system. This entailed obtaining short term financing from the First Trust and Deposit Company of Syracuse (now Key Bank) and the Chase National Bank of New York (now Chase Manhattan). It also entailed obtaining long-term financing from the Berkshire Life Insurance Company of Pittsfield, Massachusetts and the sale of Preferred Stock within the Community.

All of these financial requisites were successfully met and the Finger Lakes Telephone Corporation was converted from a Magnets (hand crank) System to an Automatic Dial System, which enabled its subscribers to dial directly (without charge) four-hundred thousand subscribers in the Syracuse Metropolitan Area.

The Conversion to Dial Ceremony was conducted on a November evening in 1952 at the telephone

office. Those in attendance included the local Preferred Stockholders, telephone officials from the Independent Industry and the New York Telephone Company, Banking officials from both banks and pastors of the local churches in Marcellus. Marcellus Town Supervisor, Morris Mulroy, Marcellus Mayor V. S. Kenyon, Village Councilmen Seymour Parsons and Lester Norris pulled the switches to cut out the old and cut in the new. This ceremony was also covered by Collier's Magazine, a national publication. The story came out in a February, 1953 issue.

The 1950's and 1960's saw an ever growing movement out of the urban areas of the nation into the suburbs and even into the rural areas. Marcellus and surrounding areas, being immediately adjacent to Syracuse, benefited from this trend and, of course, so did the telephone company.

Notes: The Finger Lakes Telephone Corporation became a subsidiary of Mid-Continent Telephone Co. in 1966 and merged with Midstate Telephone Corp. in 1969. When Mid-Continent merged with Allied Telephone of Little Rock in 1984, the name was changed to Alltel of N.Y. Alltel changed to a computerized system in September of 1988 and in August of 2006, it became Windstream.

One Hundred Years Ago in Marcellus

Marcellus Observer May 1, 1914

HISTORY FOR OUR OLD HOME WEEK MARCELLUS 1794-1914, 120 YEARS, IN BRIEF

Historical Sketch of Marcellus, Prepared by Mr. Geo. L. Amerman, in Connection with Plans for Old Home Week, July 21-25.

The town of Marcellus was given its present classic name by Simeon DeWitt, surveyor, from Marcellus, a celebrated Roman general and statesman. It originally included many of the surrounding towns, the present township as erected in 1840 being only about one-tenth of its original size.

It was settled at about the same time on the east and west hills, in Tyler Hollow and Clintonville, by sturdy men of character who mostly came from Massachusetts, Connecticut and Vermont. The first permanent settlers of Marcellus village were Hon. Dan Bradley and Deacon Samuel Rice: Mr. Bradley, father of Isaac Bradley, came in 1795 and erected the second frame house in the town; Deacon Rice, grandparent of Dr. Israel Parsons, built the tavern, where the Catholic church now stands. The Seneca turnpike was a development of the Great Indian Trail running east and west through the State. Dr. Elnathan Beach was the first physician, the first postmaster, appointed in 1799, and the first sheriff of Onondaga county.

The first school was started in 1796 in a log house at the rear of the present Presbyterian church with Dan Bradley as its teacher. The first church was organized in 1801, the Eastern Religious society of Marcellus in 1802, its first church edifice was built in 1802, at that time "the only meeting house between New Hartford, Oneida county, and the Pacific ocean." The present Presbyterian church was built in 1851, the present Methodist church in 1877, the St. Frances Xavier's Roman Catholic church in 1867, and the present Episcopal church was built, after two of its church buildings had been destroyed by fire on the corner of Main and North streets, now occupied by the Knapp block.

The Coyne store building, once famous for containing the Harrison Tippacanoe headquarters, was built of local brick in 1840. The Erie canal was built in 1825, the Syracuse and Auburn branch of the New York Central railroad in 1836. In 1835 the township had 511 persons liable for military duty, and the village had 4 stores and 80 dwellings. The population of the town since 1830 has not varied from

2,600. Since 1850 the village has had a normal growth. The present school building was built in 1892 at a cost of \$14,375, and, after being placed under the State Board of Regents, graduated its first class in 1893.

In agricultural products Marcellus has always excelled and especially, during the early days, in sheep raising and in its wool market. Manufacturing has always been an important factor and her woolen mills and paper mills have made Marcellus noted, the Crown Woolen Mills company entering the field in 1890 with Mr. Edward Moir as general manager and superintendent.

Marcellus celebrated the 100th anniversary of the American Independence in 1876 when the "Centennial History of Marcellus" was written by Dr. Israel Parsons and published by Edmund Reed, who also established the first newspaper in Marcellus, the "Observer," in 1879.

The village of Marcellus lies on Nine Mile creek, 673 feet above sea level, and nestled between hills which are noted for their beauty and fertility. The Auburn & Syracuse Electric road furnishes easy connection with those places and with Skaneateles, while from north to south runs the Marcellus & Otisco Lake steam road, furnishing freight transportation for the great agricultural yields as well as access to Otisco Lake, one of the gems of the Central New York "finger-lakes."

Marcellus today, in 1914, offers you pure air, pure water, a wholesome and healthy locality, with all the advantages of 1794, one hundred and twenty years ago - and some more.
