Marcellus 50 Years Ago

Father Harnett Retires; Named Pastor Emeritus of St. Francis

The Rev. Daniel C. Harnett, whose retirement from the pastorate of St. Francis Church was announced last week, has been named pastor emeritus of the Church by the Most Rev. Walter A. Foery, bishop of the Syracuse diocese, and will remain in Marcellus in that capacity.

The bishop announced the appointment Tuesday.

St. Francis was thronged with worshippers last Sunday when hundreds turned out to pay homage to Father Hartnett, whose retirement was announced last Thursday.

Father Hartnett, who has spent a third of a century as pastor of St. Francis, was visibly effected by the display of affection on the part of his parishioners.

The new pastor of the church has been announced as the Rev. J. Robert Quigley, pastor of Our Lady of Holy Rosary Church, Hannibal, and St. Joseph's Church in Oswego.

Father Hartnett's assistant, The Rev. Martin James Lutz, who came to St. Francis in 1965, also moves out of the parish, going to the Cathedral of SS. Peter and Paul in Syracuse as an assistant.

In appointing Father Hartnett pastor emeritus, Bishop Foery said: "As pastor emeritus, Father Hartnett has the right to choose his place of residence, and it is wish that he stay at St. Francis Xavier in Marcellus." The bishop assured him that he would receive every care and every welcome from Father Quigley.

"Since Father Hartnett has baptized and administered the sacraments to the majority of the present parishioners of St. Francis," Bishop Foery continued, "he will always be their spiritual father and continue to have a place in their hearts.

Farther Harnett, who was born in Truxton 76 years last November, did not have any plans for his retirement when this paper went to press.

His parents were killed in an accident on their way to see him ordained at St. Bernard's Church, Rochester, nearly 50 years ago.

A complete stranger to Marcellus, he arrived on Armistice Day 1933. Before that he been an assistant in Whitesboro and then pastor in Hamilton.

Bishop Foery Joins Local People

For many years he was prominent in Marcellus Civic Affairs and is one of the recipients of the annual Citizens Club Award for outstanding citizenship.

The men of the parish about six years ago raised enough money to send him to Rome during the Martian Year, but he refused to leave Marcellus where he had spent so many years.

Years ago he bought the pipes for an old organ in Ithaca and with the aid of an organ mechanic built the organ which the church now uses.

Always useful with his hands, there were many occasions when helped with repairs of the church—not because the church couldn't afford the repairs but because he like to keep busy.

Generous in his charities, he spent much of his efforts in making sure that everything in the Altar was the best.

Fond of children, his affection was reciprocated and many of the children whom he had baptized were present at the service Sunday.

In his early years in Marcellus he liked to play golf and frequently scored in the 80's. In recent years his out door activities have been confined to his vegetable and flower garden. And the garden was in fact the cause of the illness which sent to the hospital recently. Apparently allergic to various pollen and mold, he was stricken with pneumonia and spent several weeks in the hospital.

Marcellus One Hundred Years Ago

EXTINGUISHER PAYS IN A WEEK

ATTENTION:

Camillus, Elbridge, Amber, Navarino, Onondaga Hill, South Onondaga, many other communities.

Marcellus Village took a two-wheel fire extinguisher on trial, and it was placed in the engine house Saturday Feb. 1.

Sunday, Feb. 17, at noon, a fire alarm called the department to the home of William Fikes. The heat of the fire was located and one blast from the hose finished it.

The extinguisher had saved a new dwelling and paid for the cost twice over within a week from its installation.

Why not go and do likewise?

The house is out of the corporation. Hose was strung from the last hydrant at Rossers and laid as far as the railroad track. The house was a half mile away. The extinguisher was hauled ahead of the hose cart and taken anywhere, and done the work.

We give below Elmer P Clark's version of the fire:

Last Sunday Marcellus Had cause to be pleased with the first practical work done by the new chemical engine recently purchased by the village.

The occasion was the breaking out of a fire in the house occupied by William Fikes across the creek opposite the upper Crown Mills. Volumes of smoke were pouring out and the blaze was eating its way rapidly inside the outer walls from cellar to roof, defying all means at hand to putting it out. Heroic work was done smashing windows, chopping through lathe and plaster and carrying out household goods until the heat and smoke drove them out.

Time was lost in sounding the alarm, but in five minutes after the bell rang the chemical hose was turned on. The engine responded performing its work in perfect way and completely subduing the flames in a very few minutes.

Much credit is due fireman for the long haul and the quick and effective work done, also to others of the company stretched two lines of hose
Ready for any emergency that might occur.

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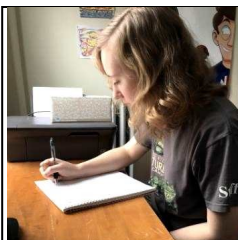
Crown Mills has told Mr. Clark they will build a hose for both a chemical engine and a hose cart, just north of the bridge. They owned the house which caught fire.

The Weather Man's Record

Last Saturday was the worst day of the winter season, wind howled for days before and after, traffic almost stopped, drifts were not so bad as snow was not plentiful but autos were stuck, Dr. Lowell being victim again, this time by Ed Cornwell's and near there also a big city rig was dug out. Morton Amidon also got caught. Phone lines were out of order. It ranged around 8 below Saturday morning, to 10 below that day and evening. It has been lower before this season. Wind blew right through houses, people finding greater difficulty than almost ever before to keep warm. Even Levi Parsons didn't have coal enough (or good coal or not enough) to keep his own home warm. (That's a hard story on a coal man, but a shoemaker's wives go barefoot.) Houses across lots could not be seen with the drifting and light falling snow. It was a teaser, a blizzard, Marcellus carriers (some of them—we presume others) could not make their full trip. When this occurs the last day of the week folks fail to get their papers for Sunday, most serious to them, leaving nothing to read but the Bible.

has allowed Christ to work through him.”

Lester Norris, mayor of Marcellus, said that the people of Marcellus, Catholic and Protestant, will miss Father Hartnett tremendously, “He has been a pillar of strength and a comfort to the whole community.”

The Rev. Martin James Lutz, assistant at St. Francis Church said “The goodness and kindness of Father Hartnett will last to eternity. Many of his accomplishments will not be known, except to those who have benefited through them. Marcellus has been richly rewarded by his work.”

Don Hickman, proprietor of Hickman’s Grocery Store, and a long time friend of Father Hartnett, said, “One of the nicest men who ever drew a breathe,” describing him.

And Mary Wybron, one of the oldest members of the parish and lives across from the church, said, “His old housekeeper, Miss Duffy, introduced me to Father Hartnett 33 years ago as a saint, and the fact has been proven to us.”

One of the highlights of the evening came at half time when the varsity and junior varsity basketball team of 1937, marched in to the tune “The Gallant Men” played by the MCS band.

The 1937 varsity members present were John Ward, George Manahan, Cliff Buffin, Harold Chapman Hugh Dawson. Mr. Dawson, on behalf of the School Board, later spoke saying that he hoped that future generations would enjoy the gym, and also that “this might be a turning point for the team and Coach Mert Raner.”

The 1937 junior varsity attending were Donald Pitman, Paul Fitzpatrick, Earl Macholl, Jack O’Shea, Butch Hunt, George Taylor, Jack Mullens and Glen Garvey.

Mr. Bailey, senior high principal, on behalf of the administration, bade everyone welcome and thanked the community for being as patient as they had, waiting for the completion of the gym.

“Once you saw the new gym, I am sure that you feel that it is well worth the wait,” said Mr. Bailey.

Mr. Bailey also announced that there will be an Open House in the new high school, Sunday afternoon, March 19, 3-5p.m., so that the public may visit the school’s facilities.

Three Garages For Marcellus

Frank H. Gillette has purchased Dr. J. C. Parsons the property next north from The Observer office, the entire frontage on North Street, including the Bee Hive and land on which John Grimes shop stands. Mr. Grimes owns this little building, he has paid annual ground rent many years past, has become a fixture, our only cobbler of the old school, probably the oldest business in town. It is understood this building may be moved. Mr. Gillette is to build a modern garage on this site somewhere. His plans are not certain, whether he will build on the Grimes site, leaving the Bee Hive front unobscured, or build in front of this tenant house, in which event the Grimes building could remain as it is. Mr. Gillette has agency for Ford cars.

This follows the announcement of James Pilot that he would build a garage south of his shop. He broke ground for this before the extreme weather. He is local agent of the Chevrolet cars. If Mr. Gillette plans mature as well as Mr. Pilot's, it will place two modern garages almost side by side, fronting the same and within fifty feet of each other. This will make three in Marcellus, with the present Bowen garage. The auto business is rushing.
