People from Marcellus

Ella Barber was born October 22, 1856 in Marcellus the daughter of Gay P. and Diantha Barber. They lived in the Ray house were the current Post Office is located. The family moved to Syracuse in 1861.

Gay Barber was born in 1817 and died August 20, 1883 in Syracuse. While in Marcellus he owned the Marcellus Falls Clock Factory making buttons for clothing. In Syracuse he was associated with the Singer Sewing Machines. Gay's wife Diantha Clark Barber was born in April 1837 in Cleveland New York and died May 10, 1916 in Syracuse. Gay and Diantha are buried in Onondaga Valley Cemetery. There children were born: Ella B., Alice D., and Margaret.

Alice D. Barber was born June 5, 1860 in Marcellus and died February 15, 1934 in Syracuse. She married George F. Raynor, who passed away December 2, 1913 in Syracuse. Alice and George are buried in Onondaga Valley Cemetery.

Margaret Barber was born June 5, 1859 in Marcellus. She married William N. Herman in 1920. Margaret died August 11, 1945 in Marcy New York and buried in St, Mary's Cemetery in Jewel New York.

Ella Barber while attending a dance at Syracuse University met J. C. DeLima from Brazil. They married October 5, 1878 in Syracuse. J. C. and Ella left for Brazil following the wedding. J. C.'s father was a large land holder in Brazil, which contained large coffee plantations. J. C. became a diplomat for Brazil traveling the world.

Five children were born of this union: Gay, Antonio, Paul, John and Maria. The boys were all born in Brazil while Maria was born in Canada. In 1889 Ella wanted the children educated in the United States, so she and the children come back to Syracuse living on the northside. Her husband paid for their passage back to Syracuse. Ella took part of this money and bought coffee beans to bring back with her.

Upon returning to Syracuse Ella and the boys starting roasting and grinding the coffee beans to sell. Everything was done in the house. Ella started the DeLima Brothers Coffee business. As the business grew they moved to a building in Syracuse. The coffee was sold to restaurants, colleges and large corporations at first. Everyone kept asking to have the coffee sold in grocery stores for the general public to purchase. They decided to try selling to stores as well as large institutions.

They moved from downtown Syracuse to the near eastside into their own building. Ella's son Paul bought the company and renamed it Paul DeLima Coffee in 1915.

Paul DeLima Coffee continued to grow but the large coffee makers did not like the small coffee company having shelf space taken away from their shelf space in the stores. The large coffee makers forced Paul DeLima Coffee off the store shelves. So Paul decided to go back to selling to large institutions to stay in business. He succeeded. Paul DeLima Coffee still exists. I was in Syracuse the other day and a Paul DeLima Coffee truck was delivering to a store.

Ella Barber DeLima died May 3, 1934 in Syracuse. She was cremated in Rochester New York. Her son Paul died December 23, 1972 in Syracuse and is buried in Morningside Cemetery.

Letter from Willis J. Raymond, a "Marcellus Boy", who indicates his happy memories of youth by a letter touching upon old time things.

To the Editor:

I receive the Home Paper regularly each week, and am always anxious to read it as soon as it arrives to learn what has taken place in old Marcellus since the week before.

The improvements I am always glad to note, but the deaths of the ones I used to know bring sorrow to my heart. The ranks of the old timers, and I can see them now just as they used to look as they walked around, are getting thinned out and a younger generation are taking their places. That is the reason I walked the full length Main Street when I was home two years ago, and did not see face I knew. The latest to go was Wm. H. Wright. I knew him as long back as I can remember, and always respected him as honest, hard working man. I see too that Mr. and Mrs. Nightingale have passed beyond. They were fine people. When I was a lad I used to go up to their home with Frank, their son, and a good friend of mine, and stay over the weekend and I was always welcome. I felt sad indeed, when I read of their deaths.

Warren Alvord was another good citizen whose death I read with regret, and many others. But I must not forget "Patsy" Halloran. He was one of nicest fellows I ever met.

Business Block on North Street Changes Hands

The building at 13 North Street Marcellus, which housed the Fountain, one time favorite hangout for youngsters, has been sold by Seymour Parsons and has been converted into apartments.

The buyer, Charles Driscoll, Highland Ave. contractor, has replaced the display windows and has shingled the front of the property. All the apartments are reportedly rented.

Mr. Driscoll recently purchased the Mary Wybron house on South Street and added an apartment to the dwelling.

The building at 13 North Street is one of the oldest business buildings in Marcellus and was for many years the home of the Marcellus Observer when it was owned by Roy Gallinger, Henry King, and by Henry Steele.

Part of the building appears to be much older than the other and reportedly was used as a meeting place for many years by one of the fraternal orders.

Other members of the slate picked b the Republicans to run in the fall, all incumbents, are councilman, Kenneth Jewell and John Bednarski; town clerk, Sarah Hettinger; receiver of taxes, Margaret Sherer; superintendent of highways, Earl Dence; assessor (2 years), Fred Seely; and assessor (4 years), Ronald Linderman.

75 Years Ago

D-Day Plus One

Lt. Daniel Banky, brother of Mrs. Edward Schmuckmier of Marcellus, was pilot of the "Baby Kismet," one of the first planes to brave the enemy fire to drop its load of paratroopers.

The Letter June 7, 1914

"How goes it? I hope it goes as well with you as with me. I mean it. You see the date on this letter? Good. So you can tell that it is "OK, Roger."

We went over at 10 p. m., and got there at 1.15 a. m. of the 6th. Had quite a session, but not too bad. Started over the French coast in the clouds, and when we broke—Wow! All hell was there waiting for us. A wall of steel all around us. If it wasn't so deadly we could have called it beautiful. Every color imaginable. We only had 15 minutes of it, but it was so thick I could of taxied across if I put my wheels down.

Boys Can Laugh

It was funny. I'd look out on my side and see it coming up at us, and I'd lean over on my co-pilot (trying to dodge it instinctively) and he'd be doing the same thing. We'd look at each other and both laugh.

We had flak suits on, plus all our other equipment. I can tell you it was tough just trying to move. We dropped our paratroops where they wanted them, even if I did have to turn out to the right and into a lot of it. Then I turned left again through it and into the other that I'd come out of, to lead out over the drop zone. It took a lot to do it, when your fear told you to bend the throttles and get out of there.. The most helpless feeling I've ever had, believe me. All we could do was sit there and take it

We went in again this morning to drop gliders. What a sight it was! Thousands of ships. Ourforces had complete control of the beach and some miles inland. It was well in hand. They had wiped out most of the flak and beach installations. All we encountered was some small 'arms fire, and a very little of that.

Ship still Whole

'Our Baby Kismet* still has a whole hide; How that is is beyond me after all she went through.

And the best part of it is that she will probably keep it that way because we've gone through all we are going to. We'll probably land supplies and evacuate the wounded from now on. That will be far from the front lines and will not entail any danger. "I just want you to know that I'm still kicking, and now that *it* has started, we will probably be home for Christmas.

This week I will start south from St. Francis Xavier Church. Where the church parking lot is was the old school house. In 1892 the school moved to the new school house on W. Main St. and the old building was sold to George Hellganz. George was a cigar maker with his brotherin law, O'Grady, (I forgot his first name) O'Grady started a saloon in the south wing of the ol schoolhouse. O'Grady operated it for some time then George took over the saloon and ran it, I believe, until he died. In those days you could get a lunch with a glass of beer. George made lots of

saurkraut and he would serve a plate of kraut and franks, or you could have a limburger sandwich. Those were the good old days. Next place was owned by Mrs. DeCourdes. She had a daughter, Maude, who married late in life to John Stearns. The next place was Mrs. Dr. Rhodes. She had a son, Charles. Todd Woods, lives there now. The next place, where Kenneth King lives, was built for Michael Kennedy and he lived there in 1890. As I remember, the next place was built for John Duggan. John had a saloon where Ed Sennett is on Main St. The old building was a small building and was called the Cottage Saloon. John had three boys, Edward, Charles and Cletus. Fred Uttley lived in the next house and he sold it to Isaac Richards. The next place, where Mrs. Harry Masters lives, was built for Henry Jones.
