Baker's Dam

Early settlers in Marcellus became very interested in milling operations along Nine Mile Creek because of the waterpower it generated. The first was a sawmill built in 1796, and then a gristmill in 1827. The old stone gristmill as it came to be known "... was built by Edward Talbot and Joseph Taylor in 1827-28, and at that time was one of the finest structures in the place. They were succeeded by Edward Talbot, father-in-law of Newton G. Case, who sold it to Beach Brothers, of Rochester, but soon took it back. Several proprietors followed, one being N. R. Shepard. It burned in May 1889. On the east side of the stream, below the bridge, Daniel Hutchinson had a distillery at an early day, and on the same side John R. Kellogg later built a larger one. On the west side was another distillery, and also a brewery operated by William Meachan, and here Isaac Benham was the principal manager for many years." For a few years, in the 1880s, Charles Hooper conducted a furniture factory on the west side of the creek, in the building now owned Scott McClurg. There was probably a natural waterfall in this area, which helped to power all of these mills.



Eventually, a dam was built on the creek that destroyed any natural waterfall that may have been there and very quickly a large lily pond grew to the south of the dam, extending all the way back to where the Braeside Apartments are located today. The dam came to be owned by Robert M. Baker (1847-1925) who had a saw and feed mill on the east side of the stream, beginning in 1883, lasting until 1915. It came to be known, as Baker's Dam, and Baker himself appeared to be a very creative person, as this article from The Marcellus Observer attests:

Baker's Dam

The Marcellus Observer March 6, 1890 Will Wonders Never Cease?

At the regular monthly meeting of the Fire Department on Monday evening there was shown

By the turn of century, Baker and Frank Knapp, another enterprising person in the Village, teamed up and by utilizing the power of Baker's Dam, provided a new source of power to light several homes and businesses in the Village. It was also used to power the first telephone line that ran from the Village to Marcellus Falls, serving 16 customers, another Knapp business called the Marcellus Telephone Company.

"Came Out of Darkness"

Marcellus wakened from the dead Tuesday night, October the fifteenth, nineteen hundred seven, and took unto itself electric lights. They were discovered several years ago, but we just heard of them and thanks to the faithful and civic pride, together with a hope of revenue justly due, of Frank W. Knapp, who has the plant we shall hereafter be able to find our way from the trolley to our homes without the aid of a dark lantern or Jim Powell's matches. The dynamo is installed in the Robert M. Baker mill, with his waterpower, and while the night Tuesday was moonlight, there is every indication that the location and power of the new arc lights will be highly satisfactory.





By 1915, Robert Baker decided to sell his mill and dam, and by 1917, the dam and the old flume were no longer practical and the area fell into neglect.

Baker's Dam

Robert M. Baker has operated his sawmill and power on Nine Mile Creek in Marcellus since 1883. He has now sold the property to his nephews Robert and Dwight Stone.

In January 1955, with ice covering the old pond, two young boys were playing outside down near the creek, about 150 feet above the old Baker Dam. One of them fell in and it took some time before firemen found the body down near the bridge. He was just five years old. According to Peg Nolan, Lester Norris told her that Wally Pepperman, who owned much of the property now occupied by the Braeside Apart-

ments, blew up the dam soon after-probably in the spring.

Today the dam is now in ruins, with only a few rocks remaining from the western wall, the dam having been destroyed following that tragic drowning in 1955.




From 1955 to the present, the creek began to reclaim the land, and the area became a wilderness of trees, swampy, overgrown and neglected – virtually inaccessible – until now!

With the completion of the Village creek walk project in the summer of 2017, plans are in place to remove the wilderness of trees and vegetation and expose the old ruins, perhaps with an historic overlook noted at the site.

Baker's Dam is certainly a significant part of Marcellus' history and the completion of the creek walk will help us to remember that past.
